

Neonates

The experiences of birth and the speed at which young kittens and puppies grow and change would almost seem magical. Being able to enjoy this experience with a pet that you love is a very rewarding experience. Knowing how to prevent problems and give proper care will help insure a great experience with a wonderful outcome. Neonates are from the time pups or kittens are born until they are about 6 weeks old but proper care begins even before conception.

Neonates have special needs and can be very susceptible to environmental extremes, nutritional insufficiencies and some diseases. Prevention and early detection of problems is the best way to insure happy and healthy puppies or kittens at an early age.

- Insure Dam is up to date on all vaccines prior to breeding
- Check and comply with all AKC or other breed requirements to insure bad traits are not pass on
- Insure you can easily find good homes for the pups or kittens prior to breeding
- Start feeding the mom, a high-quality puppy food, 3-4 weeks prior to expected delivery
 - We carry Science Diet Growth, a high-quality diet excellent for pregnant females
- Insure dam is at a good body condition (not too fat or too skinny)
- Set up a whelping and nursery area several days prior to whelping
 - o Draft free, warm, quite area (minimize anything that may cause stress).
 - Guard rails to prevent pups from being crushed, and material that is easy to clean and disinfect.
- Read over and understand stages of parturition (giving birth), and know when and how to intervene and when to call a veterinarian when needed.
- insure the new born receive adequate colostrum.
- Weigh pups/kittens when born
- Weigh daily for the first 14 days and record weights, then weigh every 3 days for the first month of life
 - Slight weight loss may be seen the first 24 hr. thereafter there should be a gain of .03-.1 ounce gain daily for every lb. of expected adult weigh
- Young neonates cannot regulate body temperature very well, therefore, we need to maintain an environmental temperature of between 80 90 degrees for the first 4 weeks of life.
- If tails and dew claws are going to be removed, 3 days of age is ideal; please do not wait until they are over 5 days old.
- De-wormer for many types of round worms should be used starting and 3 weeks of age and then continued every 2 weeks until over 16 weeks of age. Then monthly for life or some other type of year 'round parasite control.
 - We use pyrontel pamoate and you may pick some up at our office.
- The first set of vaccines are given at 6-8 weeks, an examination should also be done at this time.

- Call for an appointment: we will examine every puppy, give needed vaccines and de-worming, give
 you a vaccine record for the new owner or keep for yourself. This helps insure there are no hidden
 problems and adds value when selling.
- Follow up vaccines are given every 3 weeks until the pups are over 16 weeks old
